**Grant: Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Competitive Program—Category II: Providing For Funding Of Neighborhood Probation and Parole Officers.**

**Summary: Alabama Supervised Reentry Program Sustainment Project.** The project goal is to continue the Program through fiscal year 2011. The project strategies are the restoration of program funding and saving the jobs of seventeen corrections personnel, hiring two additional Corrections Officers for offender supervision, and continuing the early supervised release of offenders to the community. The key/major deliverables, defined as Recovery Act performance measures, for this project are: 1) number of jobs created / retained and 2) percentage of essential services maintained without disruption. This project is a coordinated effort through the Governor’s Office and the Department of Finance, which provided the State’s recovery strategy applicable to this project, as well the Recovery Act for the JAG (State) Program.

**Job savings/creation:** This initiative will hire and retain 19 employees.

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**Grant: Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Competitive Program -- Category IV: Hiring of Civilian Staff in Law Enforcement and Public Safety-Related Agencies**

**Summary: The Detection / Communications and Intelligence Staff Project.** The goal of this project is to hire authorized operations personnel, thus relieving sworn officers of currently assigned non-security tasks, allowing for additional inmate supervision and for increased protection of the public. The project strategies address the need to fill fourteen (14) vacant Radio Operator positions and create two (2) Criminal Intelligence Analyst positions. The key/major deliverables, the Recovery Act performance measures, for this project are: 1) number of jobs created / retained and 2) percent of essential services maintained without disruption. This project will coordinate the activities of the non-sworn civilian personnel with Correctional officers, Investigation officers, and with other Federal, State and local law enforcement agencies to maintain facility security and public safety.

**Job savings/creation:** This initiative will hire and retain 16 employees.

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**Grant: Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Formula Program.**

**Summary: The Alabama Department of Corrections' Sustainment of Critical Correctional Human Resources Project.** This project will use \$6.5 million of Recovery Act: Justice Assistance Grant Funding, during fiscal year 2009, to hire 220 new Correctional Officer Trainees for critical security posts; and for the retention of 48 Drug Treatment staff members and 14 Institutional Chaplains. Correctional Officer Trainees manning is at a critical level and is currently at 40%--these new hires are critically necessary to fill the gap left by Correctional Officer turn over. The retention of support personnel is essential in maintaining the required level of rehabilitative services necessary during incarceration and for the preparation of offenders to reenter the community.

**Job savings/creation:** This initiative will hire and retain 285 employees.

**Summary: Energy Performance Contracting Services Project.** The project goal is to maximize energy savings and related improvements through upgrades to correctional facility infrastructure equipment and services. The Alabama Department of Corrections through the State competitive bid process will select a qualified Energy Services Company (ESCO) capable of providing comprehensive energy management and energy-related capital improvement services at the facilities. The resulting contract will be for a full range of energy services and energy related capital improvements designed to reduce energy costs at its facilities.

**Job savings/creation:** This initiative will hire and retain 1,052 employees.

<b>Other Comments</b>	Energy Service Agreements with Noresco LLC and Johnson Controls, Inc. to provide services on 205 planned individual retrofit projects were signed by the Governor on July 19, 2010. Department of Energy approved ECM projects have been completed and final inspections are in progress at selected correctional facilities. The following facilities are showing indications that our energy conservation measures are reducing energy consumption: ACI Admin Officer & Warehouse, Atmore Work Center, Bibb County Correctional Facility, Birmingham Work Release Center, Bullock County Correctional Facility, Childersburg Work Release, Donaldson Correctional Facility, Draper Correctional Facility, East Thomas, Elmore Correctional Facility, Farquhar Cattle Ranch, Institutional Services, Kilby Correctional Facility, Limestone Correctional Facility, Loxley Work Release Center, Red Eagle Work Center, St. Clair Correctional Facility, and Staton Correctional Facility. 205 of 205 ECM's are 100% complete. Final invoices, documentation and reports are being prepared for submission.

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**Grant: Recovery Act: State Fiscal Stabilization Fund Allocation**

**Summary: Sustainment of State Correctional Services.** The project goal is to sustain critical correctional operations and ensure public safety through funding of correctional security and support personnel salary and benefits, and funding of contracted inmate medical insurance premiums. The Alabama Department of Corrections (ADOC) is authorized to hire 3,945 security personnel, of which 2,977 are currently employed (75.5%). A total of 5,436 departmental security and administrative personnel are authorized for the entire Agency. For the Fiscal Year 2008, personnel salaries and benefits accounted for \$234,013,018 or 56.9% of the total expenditures for the Department. Excessive reductions in State General Fund revenues will be addressed through utilization of the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund revenues to supplement the Fiscal Year 2010 appropriation for the ADOC.

**Job savings/creation:** This initiative will sustain positions for 3900+ agency personnel.
